Secretary's Scoop



The 02-02-2020 meeting of the State Line Gem and Mineral Society was called to order by President Sherm at 2:16 PM. Eddie gave the invocation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Doris made a motion to accept the secretary's report as printed in the newsletter, seconded by Judy and passed with all in favor.

Treasurer's report – Doris paid the rent and utilities, Ohio sales tax, newsletter related expenses and equipment replacement costs. Sherm inquired about the Ohio sales tax, as he recalled that being mentioned in last month's meeting. Doris explained that since the meeting was held on Jan 05, she included the expense in the report so the current balance as of Jan 05

would reflect the correct information. The February report was for the income and expenses incurred in the month of January, which included the afore mentioned Ohio Sales and Use Tax. They were paid one time.

Linda Miller made a motion to accept the treasurer's report, seconded by Carl and passed with all in favor.

Old business – Sherm reported that Greg (our landlord) was going to have the water leak at the front of the building sealed and the light in the office replaced. Greg said that since he was not able to do the work himself, he asked Larry Sines, the previous landlord to have his work crew do the work. Sherm said that Greg definitely was not going to be moving any inside walls.

Sherm stated that he received information regarding a possible new clubhouse site in Onsted. He had not called on it. He doubted that it would be any better than what we already had as it was only 1500 square feet and a two story building for about \$800.00/month.

Doris gave Sherm a list of storage rental places that she had researched and thought we could store some of the geodes and tents at one of these 5' by 8' storage units for about \$40.00 per month. Glenda said she called a realtor and gave our specifications for a new clubhouse, and he found nothing in the area within our price range. Sherm said he felt we had our own members looking for possible sites that hopefully would be able to locate other properties.

Sherm reported that he replaced the saw blade on the slab saw and all six diamond wheels on the Genie at our work day last week. Other members also cleaned up other areas and got some rocks cleaned up and organized. Eddie removed some of the old oil from the machines in the front room, and replaced the bearings in one of the machines. Sherm stated that he will have additional expenses related to other machines. Richard B. made a motion to reimburse Sherm for the aforementioned parts, seconded by Kathy and passed with all in favor.

Sherm had his first lapidary class on Thursday January 30, 2019 from 6:00 PM to 9:00 PM. He had 5 students attend. He plans to continue Thursday evening classes.

Jan reported that we have enough grab bags for the Jackson show but we would need another work day to create enough bags for the rest of the season. After some discussion, it was decided that the grab bag work day would be February 18th at 10:00 AM.

Doris noted that the small stained glass donation box was a bit cramped with donations from the lapidary classes so she brought a slightly larger candy jar for donations. It will be located on top of the microwave for easy access. The suggested \$2.00 per session was to help replace worn saw blades and diamond wheels. Doris also mentioned that we had a problem with members leaving their pop cans and water bottles all over creating a messy situation. Bill Schultz had asked if the club has a procedure to notify members if other club members had a loss in their family. After some discussion, Kathy said she could notify the members who receive email and the few members who receive snail mail she would volunteer to call on the phone. If Kathy is not available, Judy volunteered to be the back up person to notify. Bench Tips

IDENTIFYING UNMARKED SOLDERS

There are plenty of ways to mark your sheet or wire solders, but suppose you forgot to mark them and have a couple that you can't identify. The answer is to compare the melting temperature of the unknowns with that of a known solder. What I do is take a thick scrap of copper or nickel and arrange several solders on it. Ideally, I would have a sample of easy, medium and hard known solders surrounding the unknown solder. Then I heat the plate from the bottom and watch the order in which the solders melt.



INEXPENSIVE ELECTRIC WAX PEN

You can make your own wax pen from a small soldering iron plugged into a light dimmer switch for heat control. Both components are easily found at a big hardware store or at Harbor Freight. As an example of the components, see items # 43060 and # 47887

File the tip of the soldering iron into the shape you prefer or even better get a soldering iron with replaceable tips. Then you can make several tip shapes for different tasks. Set the dimmer control just hot enough to melt the wax without producing any smoke.

A tip design that I find ideal for some work is a length of small gauge wire that lets me reach in around the model to melt some wax. The wire is 18ga and about 15mm long. I use Sterling wire to conduct heat easily to the tip, and I silver solder it into a hole on the end of a copper or brass rod that fits into the soldering iron.

Pistachios and Minerals - How are they linked?

We are Pistachio Farmers. We have about 200 nut bearing trees that are around 20 years old.

We take great joy in mining minerals to use in production of our pistachio harvest – We want to share with you what we do with the minerals and, most importantly, give you the chance to enjoy some of our harvest!

Pistachio trees are either male or female. You can graft the two together and have one hermaphroditic tree, as we have one of these in our grove, however, for the most part, they are separate and do different things.

The female tree has big broad leaves and branches that have lots of curves and style. The male tree has very thin leaves and sharp pointed branches that have sharp, straight, shoots. The female tree is the one that bears nuts, the male tree is responsible for the pollination. They are wind pollinated, so the timing has to be perfect every year during pollination.

The first mineral we mine and use is raw gypsum/selenite. Just a few miles away from our orchard, we have extensive deposits of raw gypsum, which we then water tumble in a giant 50 pound vibrating tumbler. The "waste" water is a large part of what we need for the grove. Every year we make a fertilizer for the tree including pistachio wood ash, steer manure, a rich compost and tea, plus, crushed gypsum, all watered down with our waste water from the gypsum tumbling.



Gypsum has a wonderful effect on soil, creating a path way for water

to seep deeper into the ground. This is especially useful for this climate as the soil around the trees needs to soak in the water rapidly to the trees, rather than evaporating away from the top of the soil.

The larger pieces of gypsum are then sold as tumbled stones by us at mineral shows and even on Amazon.com.



There are two important times in the pistachios tree's lives every year. In the beginning of spring, which is around March, the branches start to bud.

During this time, pollination is right around the corner, but first, they need a treatment of minerals to help them through the year. A mixture of Borax and Zinc are prepared and sprayed onto the tree's branches, in order to do two things. The Borax, which we mine in Searles' Lake every October, makes the hard shell form thinner, which allows the pistachio seed to break open the shell

while on the tree, something we want to happen.

The Zinc allows the stems and seeds to hold fast onto the tree, which is very important because the winds in this part of the world can be devastating to an non zinc treated tree, dropping all the blooms and seeds onto the ground, resulting in a loss of pistachios.

Pistachios

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At the end of October and beginning of November, the trees are harvested. Most orchards harvest with a tree shaker, we harvest ours by hand. It requires a lot of labor and time, but it is what we choose to do. It makes us appreciate these delicious tree seeds a bit more! We separate the nuts



from the stems by rolling them around on a large tarp, where the stems start to float to the top of the pile, then, scoop up the pistachios, put them in an industrial peeler which removes the fleshy coating, then float the nuts in a vat of water. The empty nuts float to the top and the ones with nuts sink to the bottom. They are then air dried and roasted with pistachio wood to fuel our ash needs for the following year. We brine some of our nuts with pink salt that we collect every year in Trona, California. We separate only the finest crystals for this use!

The end result?



Lightly salted, lightly roasted, pistachio seeds in shell - ready to be delivered to you!



This is a developing pistachio, before it grows the thick brown shell you are familiar with. The Boron helps to keep the nut wall from being too thick, which results in more split nuts during harvest.

I understand that another field trip was made by some of the other club members, but you will have to ask them for details.
