In Memory

Carl Mulholland was born on December 13, 1932, to a German mother and Irish father. He was described as a "rock puppy," enjoying rocks from the time he was a child. Carl was active in 4-H when he was growing up.

In his early adult life, Carl worked for the Chicago Boys Club. One of the youth at the boys club while Carl worked there was David Eisenhower, the grandson of the late president Dwight D. Eisenhower. David was able to arrange for the club to tour the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

In the early 1970s, Carl met Beverly Noble through a mutual friend. When Carl was 43 years old, he and Bev married. They celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary on November 26, 2020.



Carl taught math, shop, and a variety of subjects including a program for at-risk students, at Longfellow Junior High School in Flint, Michigan, for thirty years, until he retired.

While in Flint, Carl was an active member of the Flint Rock and Gem Club. In 1996, he was chairman of the Flint rock show. He became a life-time member of the club.

For a time, Carl and Bev lived in Colorado, where Carl was active in the Grand Junction Gem and Mineral Club. He received an award (partly in jest, though accurate,) for the "most classes taken" at the Grand Junction club.

Carl and Bev moved back to Manchester, Michigan, and Carl became a member of the Stateline Gem and Mineral Society in 2014, and also served as a director. Fieldtrips were a popular activity for Carl, typically including travels with club members a couple of times a year to Bedford, Indiana to look for geodes; and several trips to Flint Ridge to collect flint for jewelry making. In 2017, Carl and a couple of club members traveled to the big rock show at the Tucson, Arizona, Expo Center. He was a master craftsman at making jewelry, and an expert wire wrapper, too. Carl could be found manning his booth at most of the area rock club shows.

In early September 2020, Carl had a minor stroke, which led to a fall, a broken hip, and a steady decline in his health. He was at Kresge Healthcare and Rehabilitation Center in Chelsea, Michigan, where he passed away peacefully on January 31, 2021, at age 88. Due to Covid-19 restrictions, there are no plans for a service at this time.

Carl was loved by many, and was a dear friend. He will be remembered for his great sense of humor; his leadership, dedication, and active membership in the club; and his focus on education, such as getting youth interested in rock hunting, and supporting scholarship opportunities. Carl will be greatly missed!

Stromatolites

Stromatolites – Greek for 'layered rock' – are microbial reefs created by cyanobacteria (formerly known as blue-green algae).

Stromatolite deposits are formed by sediment trapping and binding, and/or by precipitation activities of the microbial communities. The microbes are active on the surface layer of the Stromatolites, while the underlying build-up is a lithified remnant of former microbial surface communities, that could be interpreted as a trace-fossil.

These deposits built up very slowly: a single 1m structure may be 2,000 to 3,000 years old. But the tiny microbes that make up modern Stromatolites are similar to organism that existed 3.5 billion years ago!

For context, consider that the Earth itself has been around for 4.5 billion years, and that Homo Sapiens have only been on Earth for 195,000 years. What's more, Stromatolites are the reason why we're alive today! Before cyanobacteria the air was only 1% oxygen. Then, for 2 billion years, our photosynthesising Stromatolites pumped oxygen into the oceans (like underwater trees, before trees existed). When the oceans' waters were saturated, oxygen was released into the air, and with around 20% of oxygen in the air, life was able to flourish and evolve.

Even today you can see Stromatolites 'fizzing' underwater, releasing oxygen.

Living Stromatolites are no longer widely distributed. There are only two well-developed marine Stromatolite areas in the world: in the Bahamas and at Hamelin Pool in the Shark Bay area of Western Australia.

Hamelin Pool is home to the most extensive living Stromatolite system in the world: the organisms thrive in the area's hypersaline water, which is twice as salty as normal seawater.

Australia's marine Stromatolites are protected: they're part of the Hamelin Pool Marine Nature Reserve, which lies within the UNESCO World Heritage listed Shark Bay. The adjacent Hamelin Station Reserve is now owned by Bush Heritage Australia.

Hamelin Pool is perfect for Stromatolites because it's hypersaline. Sea grass forms a 'barrier' between Hamelin Pool and the rest of the ocean, preventing ocean circulation, which would dilute the super-salty water.

But sea grass meadows are being damaged by the runoff caused by floods and extreme temperature events. Climate change is likely to lead to more frequent tropical storms and more frequent flooding events in the area, threatening the Stromatolites of Hamelin Pool.

Stromatolites

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Human interference is another threat. To protect the delicate structures, visitors are restricted to the boardwalk. From here they may be underwhelmed: Stromatolites look a little like cow pats from that vista. But, as Stromatolite expert Dr. Erica Suosaari says "underwater, the shapes, the sizes and the different mat surfaces are overwhelming in their variety...you feel like you're in you in a Precambrian world!".



Bench Tips

SHARP KNIVES FOR CUTTING MOLDS

Cutting molds is easier and more precise with a sharp blade. A new Xacto blade is sufficient for cutting RTV molds but is usually not sharp enough for vulcanized rubber. For that it's best to use scalpel blades available from most jewelry supply companies.

The #11 blade is triangle shaped, and the #12 is hawksbill shaped. I find the hawksbill is particularly nice for cutting the registration keys of the mold.





USE YOUR THUMB

When using multiple bits in a Foredom, we often have to deal with several different shaft sizes - the usual 3/32 inch burs, the larger 1/8 inch shafts sizes and of course the many different sizes of drills. For some reason I really dislike having to turn the key multiple times to open or close the jaws of the handpiece chuck.

So I have two ways to speed up that task. For opening up the jaws, I just remember "four", the

number of turns I have to make to open the chuck just enough from the 3/32 bur shaft size to the larger 1/8 bur shaft size.

For closing the jaws around a smaller shaft, there's a neat trick. Hold the new bit in the center of the open jaws of the chuck, put your thumb lightly onto the outer toothed collar of the chuck, and gently start up the Foredom. As the chuck turns, it will naturally tighten the jaws around the bur shaft or the drill bit. Then all you have to do is a final tightening with the key.
